The term "annual" means yearly. In a horticultural context, annuals are plants that complete their life cycle within one growing season. Although their transient nature means they need yearly planting, annuals provide the basis for spectacular season-long display gardens and are favored by many gardeners.

BENEFITS OF ANNUALS

Experienced gardeners have discovered the many advantages of including annuals in their gardening plans. Most annuals bloom consistently for three to four months. Few, if any, perennials bloom as long as petunias or impatiens, for example.

As a group, annuals also are incredibly versatile. Some are sunloving; others thrive in the shade. Some prefer dry soils; others tolerate moist soils. No matter how difficult the site, it is usually possible to find an annual that will perform beautifully.

Annuals are available in a wide variety of flower colors and plant sizes. Zinnias, for example, bloom in nearly every color (except true blue, brown, and black) and range in height from 6 inches to almost 6 feet.

Several annuals are relatively easy to grow. Sunflowers, marigolds, and zinnias, for example, are so easy that they are common features in children's gardens.

Even their lack of permanence in the garden can be an advantage. Because annuals are temporary, they are changeable from year to year. If you want a red garden one year and a blue garden the next, you can do it with annuals.

For many gardeners, these benefits far outweigh the expense and time needed for replanting every spring.

USES OF ANNUALS

Flower beds—Planting dozens of annuals in a single area ensures maximum bloom and color impact in the garden. Specimen plantings of one or two specific annuals are effectively used for contrast or close inspection near doorways, benches, or other focal points. Annuals make good filler plants between new perennials that haven't yet reached full size. They also add color and definition in front of shrub borders or around vegetable gardens.

Carpet bedding—Annual plants are traditionally used to create elaborate patterns and designs for display in public areas. While such a "carpet" requires detailed planning, planting, and maintenance, it also makes an impressive and eye-catching visual display.

Containers— Annuals are excellent candidates for container plantings used on decks, patios, entrances, and gardens. Annuals can be grown in pots, hanging baskets, window boxes, whiskey barrels, and other containers.

RIGHT PLANT, RIGHT PLACE

Annuals, like other plants, perform most successfully when given their preferred amount of sunlight and soil drainage. Plant descriptions on the following pages refer to these light definitions:

Shade—1 to 2 hours of indirect light or less

*Part shade—*2 to 4 hours of direct light in early morning or late afternoon

Part sun—4 to 6 hours of direct
light

Full sun—at least 6 hours of intense, direct light

Most annuals prefer well-drained, moist soils. Some, such as moss rose, prefer dry soils. Refer to plant labels or seed packet information to help choose plants that will do best in the existing light and soil conditions.

PLANTING TIPS

Start with good soil—Amending the soil with 2 to 3 inches of organic matter (compost, sphagnum peat, leaf mold) helps loosen the soil, increases the water holding capacity, and improves drainage. If possible, dig or till the organic matter into the soil to a depth of 8 to 12 inches. Do not dig, till, or place additional soil around the bases of large trees or shrubs. Any disturbance of the area around tree and shrub root systems could cause significant injury to the woody plants. For container plantings, lightweight, well-drained potting soil mixes are best. For more information, see "Soils for Houseplants" (PM 713f).

Planting depth—Annuals must be planted at the proper depth for best performance. Transplanted annuals should be planted at the same depth they were in their original containers. Planting too deeply can lead to root rot and, ultimately, death.

Plant spacing—To achieve success with annuals, proper plant spacing is also important. If annuals are planted too far apart, weeds will invade the area and require additional maintenance. If plants are spaced too closely, diseases can be a problem due to poor air circulation. The recommended spacing for each plant is listed on the back of seed packets, in catalogs, and on the plant labels.

CARE AND MAINTENANCE

Water—Most flowers, including annuals, require one inch of water per week from natural rainfall or irrigation. When irrigation is needed, water deeply, but infrequently in order to promote deep root growth. Frequent, light applications of water encourage shallow roots that are more susceptible to drought stress. Irrigate plants in the morning, allowing the foliage to dry quickly. Foliage that remains wet overnight is more susceptible to disease problems.

Fertilizer—Many annuals benefit from an application of a complete fertilizer, such as 10-10-10. The type of fertilizer application (granular, liquid, slow release) is a decision made by the gardener. How often should you fertilize annual plantings? Generally, only one or two applications per growing season of granular fertilizer are sufficient. Dilute solutions of liquid fertilizers should be applied once or twice per month. Excessive fertilization promotes lush, spindly growth and may inhibit flowering.

Deadheading and pruning—Many annual flowers require regular removal of faded or spent blossoms. This practice—known as "deadheading"— improves plant appearance, prevents seed formation, slows spread of agressive plants, and often encourages plants to produce more blooms. Some annuals also benefit from pruning when plants become leggy or spindly. Plants are normally cut back by half or more to encourage new, compact growth. Flowering is typically delayed for a couple of weeks after pruning.

Mulch—Mulching helps conserve moisture and control weeds. One to two inches of grass clippings, shredded bark, cocoa bean hulls, straw, or shredded leaves are acceptable mulch types to use around annual plants. Even container plantings will benefit from mulching.

Height 6 to 36 inches Width 6 to 8 inches Full sun to part shade

Flowers come in shades of blue, lavender, white, or pink. Low growing cultivars are best used as edging plants, while taller cultivars make excellent cut flowers. Ageratum prefers moist, well-drained soils. Deadheading will promote more blooms.

'Bavaria'—10 to 12 inches in height; blue and white bicolor flowers 'Blue Horizon'—24 to 36 inches in height; lavender flowers 'Danube'—9 to 12 inches in height; blue or white flowers 'Hawaii' Series—6 to 8 inches in height; blue, lavender, or white flowers

Alternanthera Joseph's Coat, Calico Plant

Height 6 to 36 inches Width 12 inches Full sun to part shade

Colorful foliage and a low-growing habit make this a popular choice for carpet bedding or other annual display gardens. Leaf colors include green, white, red, bronze, pink, and purple. Plants perform best in sunny sites with well-drained soils.

Height 1 to 5 feet Width 1 to 2 feet Full sun

This foliage plant possesses leaves of red, purple, gold, and green. It is an excellent candidate for the back of border plantings. It performs best in sunny, well-drained, dry sites.

'Aurora'—3 to 5 feet in height; creamy yellow upper leaves 'Early Splendor'—3 feet in height; bright crimson upper leaves 'Illumination'—3 feet in height; orange to scarlet upper leaves 'Perfecta' ('Splendens Tricolor')— red, gold, and green upper leaves





Height 2 to 3 feet Width 1 to 2 feet Full sun

Full, lush plants produce orchid-like blooms on upright stems and make good cut flowers. Plants are vigorous and tolerate heat and drought. They often sprawl but don't need staking. Plants prefer well-drained soil. Deadheading is seldom needed.

Height 6 to 35 inches Width 6 to 12 inches Full sun to part shade

Snapdragons are available in many colors and sizes. Plants bloom well during cool weather and make excellent cut flowers. Pinch plants when planting to encourage branching. Remove spent flowers to encourage additional flowering. Select plants that are resistant to rust.

'Black Prince'—18 to 30 inches in height; dark foliage and red flowers 'Chimes'—9 to 12 inches in height; many colors 'Floral Showers'—9 to 12 inches in height; many colors 'Madame Butterfly'—2 to 3 feet in height; flowers in many colors 'Rocket'—3 to 5 feet in height; many colors

Height 6 to 8 inches Width 12 to 16 inches Full sun

Pastel colored flowers on this trailing or spreading snapdragon make it a great addition for containers or hanging baskets.









Begonia × semperflorens cultorum Wax Begonia

Height 6 to 12 inches Width 9 to 12 inches Shade to part sun

Wax begonias have succulent, lustrous bronze or dark green leaves and red, pink, salmon, or white flowers. Plants bloom consistently from spring until frost. They prefer moist, well-drained soils. Fertilize plants regularly after planting and allow the soil to dry between waterings.

'Cocktail' Series—bronze leaf; 6 to 9 inches in height
'Encore' Series—bronze or green leaf; 9 to 12 inches in height
'Rio'—bronze leaf; early-to-flower; 8 to 10 inches in height

Height 9 to 24 inches Width 12 inches Full sun to part shade

The fine textures of the feathery foliage and the blue, white, mauve, or violet daisy-like flowers make these popular additions to containers. Plants decline with the onset of warmest temperatures and may need to be cut back in midsummer to initiate new growth. Some cultivars are propagated by seed while others are propagated by cuttings.

Height 10 to 24 inches Width 12 inches Full sun

Bright leaf colors of white, pink, magenta, red, and purple light up the fall landscape. Leaves are thick and sometimes finely dissected or ruffled. Plants perform best when planted in late summer. Cool fall temperatures help bring out the vibrant foliage colors. Plants remain attractive through late fall. Spring plantings often bolt (flower and decline) in hot weather.



Height 6 to 12 inches Width 8 inches Shade

Blue or white flowers grace these shade-loving annuals. Use fertilizer in small amounts because too much will increase foliage production and decrease the number of flowers.

'Bells' hybrids—cascading habit 'Starlight' Series—6 to 9 inches tall 'Troll' hybrids—upright habit





Calendula officinalis Pot Marigold, Calendula

Height 9 to 20 inches Width 12 inches Full sun

This native of the Mediterranean region has 3-inch diameter flowers in cream, yellow, or orange. Plants perform best in moist, well-drained soils and cool temperatures. Plantings can be made in spring and late summer.



Calibrachoa × hybrida

Trailing Petunia

Height 3 to 8 inches Width 12 inches Full sun

Plants are blanketed by hundreds of tiny petunia-like flowers in shades of peach, pink, blue, purple, or white all summer. Plants perform beautifully in containers and in well-drained soils. They tolerate high summer temperatures as well as cool fall temperatures. Plants are propagated primarily by cuttings.

China Aster

Height 6 to 36 inches Width 12 to 15 inches Full sun to part shade

The flowers of China aster resemble mums in vivid colors of red, pink, peach, blue, purple, or white. They begin blooming in mid- to late summer and continue into fall. Flowers are commonly grown for cutting and will repeat bloom after harvest. Plants prefer well-drained, fertile soils in sunny sites. Plants are susceptible to aster wilt and aster yellows, which can destroy plantings.

Height 6 to 24 inches Width 6 to 12 inches Full sun

Colorful fruits offer texture and bright colors to landscape plantings. Fruits are edible but can be extremely hot or of poor quality. Water plants on a regular basis during dry weather and fertilize sparingly.

'Black Prince'—purple foliage and peppers

'Chilly Chill'—non-pungent fruit changes from yellow to orange to red; about 12 inches in height; 2002 AAS winner

'Jigsaw'—foliage is variegated with patches of white, purple, and light green; 1-inch fruits are dark purple and develop to cherry red, but they are less showy because they are under the leaves

'Medusa'—twisted peppers mature to red, orange, cream, and yellow; 6 inches in height

'Pretty in Purple'—dark purple and green leaves; orange to red fruit

Height 6 to 12 inches Width 10 inches Full sun

This native of Madagascar has dark green glossy foliage. Flowers are 2 inches in diameter or larger and come in shades of lavender, red, pink, white, apricot, and rose—often with a contrasting eye or center. Plants perform best in moist, well-drained soils but also tolerate heat and drought. Avoid planting in wet soils.

'Blue Pearl'—light blue with white eye 'Cooler' Series—pastel flower mix with white and dark eyes; 12 to 14 inches in height; vigorous

'Jaio Dark Red'—dark red flowers with white eye; 12 to 15 inches in height; 2003 AAS winner

'Jaio Scarlet Eye'—deep rosy-red flowers with white eye; 10 to 12 inches in height; 2002 AAS winner 'Mediterranean' Series—spreading plants are suitable for hanging baskets and other containers

Height 6 to 36 inches Width 6 to 12 inches Full sun

red "combs"

The dense, convoluted flower heads resemble a rooster's comb, giving this type of celosia its common name. Plants prefer well-drained soils and are drought tolerant once established. Flowers can be large (up to 10 inches in diameter) and are available in shades of orange, yellow, pink, red, bicolor, and burgundy. Cockscomb will retain its shape and color if dried. 'Amigo Mahogany Red'—8 inches in height; purple leaves; red flowers 'Bombay' Series—many colors 'Prestige Scarlet'—12 inches in height; bronze leaves; red flowers; 1997 AAS winner 'Toreador'—18 inches in height; bright



Celosia argentea var. plumosa

Plume Celosia

Height 6 to 24 inches Width 6 to 12 inches Full sun

Flowers resemble feathery plumes and are available in shades of yellow, orange, pink, red, and purple. They can be used as cut or dried flowers. Plants tolerate hot, dry conditions once established.

'Apricot Brandy'—orange flowers; 18 to 24 inches in height 'Castle Mix'—many colors; 12 inches in height 'Fresh Look' Series—numerous sideshoots; 12 to 18 inches in height; yellow and red flowers; 2004 AAS winner 'Geisha'—6 to 8 inches in height; many



Celosia argentea var. spicata

Wheat Celosia

Height 12 to 48 inches Width 12 inches Full sun

Erect feathery flowers are similar to plumed varieties, but are smaller and spire-like. Plants prefer well-drained, dry soils and tolerate drought once established. Wheat celosia provides a vertical line element to gardens and fresh or dried floral arrangements.

'Flamingo Feather'—pale pink/white flowers; 24 to 36 inches in height 'Flamingo Purple'—purple leaves; rosy-purple flowers; 36 to 48 inches in height

'Pink Candle'—rose-pink flowers; 24 to 36 inches in height

Bachelor's Button, Cornflower

Height 12 to 18 inches Width 10 inches Full sun to part shade

Cheery flowers in shades of pink, blue, purple, and white cover the tops of the plants. Deadheading encourages the plants to rebloom. Plants are shortlived but reseed freely. Plant 8 to 12 inches apart from midspring through early summer. Fresh and dried flowers are common in floral arrangements.

'Blue Diadem'—dark blue flowers 'Choice Mix'—tall erect variety for cutting; pink, red, purple, and white flowers

Honeywort

Height 12 to 18 inches Width 12 inches Full sun to part shade

Nodding clusters of unique purplish flowers grace multiple stems. Plentiful silvery-blue foliage also adds ornamental interest. Plant 9 to 12 inches apart after last frost. Plants prefer cool sites with well-drained soils.

Height 15 to 24 inches Width 9 to 15 inches Full sun to part shade

Showy flowers come in shades of white, salmon, pink, red, and mauve. Plants prefer cooler temperatures and bloom from spring through early summer. Plant 8 to 10 inches apart in well-drained, poor-to-average soil.

'Grace' Series—24 to 36 inches in height; many colors 'Royal Bouquet Mix' —double flowers of red, peach, purple, pink, and white; 24 inches in height; prefers cool location

Cleome, Spider Flower, Cat's Whiskers

Height 3 to 5 feet Width 12 inches Full sun to part shade

Clouds of violet, white, and rose top the long graceful stems of cleome. The stamens protrude beyond the petals giving the plant its common name. Leaves are palmate, bright green, and often spiny at the base. Because of their size, plants are suitable for background plantings or as an annual hedge. Established plants tolerate heat and drought. Sow seed after last frost or start indoors 4 to 6 weeks prior to planting outside. Cleome reseeds freely. Also shown on front cover.

Height 12 to 36 inches Width 12 inches Full sun to shade

Coleus is known for its vibrantly colored foliage. Lavender or white flower spikes will be produced but are usually removed. Seed-grown cultivars can be sown indoors 6 to 8 weeks before outdoor planting. Plant after the danger of frost is past in moist, fertile, well-drained soil. Also shown on page 43.

'Black Dragon'—seed propagated; dark purple and pink leaves 'India Frills'—masses of small, serrate, rose red leaves with lime green margins

'Inky Fingers'—12 to 24 inches in height; leaves have lime green margins and nearly black centers 'Japanese Giant'—large lime green leaves have rose red margins 'Kingswood Kritter'—leaves are dappled green and yellow with purple undersides

'Solar' Series—propagated by cuttings; many colors; tolerates full sun 'Stained Glass'—foliage is dark red with candy apple red veins 'Sunlovers' Series—propagated by cuttings; many colors; tolerates full sun 'Wizard Mix' —seed propagated; many leaf colors

Larkspur

Height 24 to 30 inches Width 12 to 18 inches Full sun to part shade

Elegant flower spikes are produced in shades of pink, blue, purple, and white. Plants perform best in cool temperatures and decline with the onset of hot summer conditions. Sow seeds indoors 6 to 8 weeks before planting or direct seed in late autumn or early spring.

'Dwarf Hyacinth Mix'—2 feet in height; many colors 'Early Bird Hybrids' (Earlibird)—
2 feet in height; many colors 'Frosted Skies'—semi-double flowers; white with blue edge; 3 to 4 feet in height

'Giant Imperials'—double flowers; many colors; 3 to 4 feet in height

Dwarf Morning Glory

Height 15 to 24 inches Width 8 to 10 inches Full sun

Flashy, trumpet-shaped flowers are produced in abundance in summer. Flowers are typically blue and white with yellow centers. Plants grow best in sandy, well-drained soils. Fertilization discourages flowering.

'Dwarf Rainbow Flash'—6 to 8 inches in height; mix of flower colors 'Ensign' Series—many colors 'Flash' Series—blue, lilac, red, pink, or white flowers with white and yellow throats; 12 to 24 inches in height







Cosmos bipinnatus 'Seashells Mix'

Cosmos

Height 3 to 4 feet Width 2 feet Full sun

This old-fashioned garden flower reseeds freely. Fine textured, threadlike foliage gives the plant an open, airy appearance. The daisy-like flowers come in magenta, pink, white, and lavender and have yellow centers. Staking may be required especially in areas with strong winds. Plants perform best in dry, infertile soils with good drainage. Seeds can be sown directly in the garden after last frost or can be started indoors 5 to 7 weeks earlier.

'Daydream'—pink and white bicolor flowers; 4 to 5 feet in height 'Pied Piper' Series—red or white flowers with rolled or tube-shaped petals; 2 to 3 feet in height 'Seashells Mix'—rolled or quilled petals; pastel colors 'Sensation'—large flowers in white, rose, or pink with yellow centers 'Sonata' Series—2-to 3-inch diameter flowers; many colors; 2 feet in height



Cosmos sulphureus

Yellow Cosmos

Height 12 to 36 inches Width 15 inches Full sun

Flowers of scarlet, orange, and yellow are produced from late spring to frost. Plants perform well in dry, well-drained, infertile soils. Fertilization encourages leafy growth and delays flowering. Plants may benefit from staking.

'Bright Lights'—semi-double flowers; lemon-yellow, gold, orange, and red flowers; 3 to 4 feet in height 'Cosmic Orange'—double flowers; 12 inches in height, 2000 AAS winner 'Diablo'—yellow or orange flowers 'Ladybird' Series—12 to 15 inches in height



Datura metel

Datura, Moonflower, Horn of Plenty

Height 2 to 4 feet Width 2 to 3 feet Full sun to part shade

Trumpet-shaped, single or double flowers open in the evening and are violet, cream, white, yellow, or orange. The oval leaves are large (8 inches) and bright green. Start seeds indoors 2 to 3 months before last frost. Datura freely reseeds itself. All plant parts are poisonous. Plants tolerate poor soil, but prefer fertile, moist soil.

'Belle Blanche'—double creamy-white flowers

'Double Blackcurrant Swirl'—double dark violet flowers

'Evening Fragrance'—white flowers; gray-green leaves

Height 6 to 15 inches Width 6 to 12 inches Full sun to part shade

The eye-catching, toothed or fringed flowers come in shades of red, pink, and white. Many have differently colored eyes. Plants may overwinter. Start seeds indoors 6 to 8 weeks before last frost or purchase plants. Dianthus prefers well-drained alkaline soils. Plants are not heat tolerant and may decline in summer. Deadhead flowers to encourage additional blooms. 'Corona Cherry Magic'—2 inch flowers can be cherry red, lavender, or a bicolor blend; 2003 AAS winner 'Super Parfait' Series—compact; early to flower

Plants prefer well-drained, infertile soils. California poppy prefers cool weather. Blooming may decline during periods of high temperatures. Sow seed directly in the garden in early spring.

This plant is grown for its attractive upper leaves (bracts) which are edged in white. The white-margined leaves surround small white, inconspicuous flowers. Snow-on-the-mountain is native to Iowa.

Sunflowers prefer full sun locations with well-drained soils. Plants possess excellent heat and drought tolerance. Pollen-free types are best for cut flowers. Sow seeds directly into the garden in spring.



Seedlings are difficult to transplant; sow seeds indoors in peat pots or other biodegradable containers 6 to 8 weeks before the last frost.

Lantana is actually a woody plant grown as an annual in Iowa gardens. Plants produce clusters of white, pink, yellow, orange, lavender, or red flowers throughout the summer. Lantana is extremely heat tolerant and continues to bloom even during the hottest summers. When crushed, leaves emit a strong lemon fragrance. Plants prefer well-drained to dry soils and are ideally suited to container culture. Plants are often trained into standard forms. Plants are propagated primarily from stem cuttings. Seeds are poisonous.

Best blooming occurs in cool temperatures. Plants prefer moist, well-drained soils with some afternoon shade. Vines require support and frequent deadheading to promote blooms. Sow seed directly in the garden in early spring. Also shown on front cover.



Flowering usually declines during periods of hot weather. Sow seeds indoors 10 to 12 weeks before the last frost.

Stock is a biennial often grown as an annual for cutting gardens. The fragrant flowers are available in a wide range of colors (white, pink, red, yellow, and lavender shades) and single or double flower forms. Plants prefer well-drained, fertile soils and cool weather. Sow seeds directly in the garden in early spring.

One of the easiest annuals to grow, plants produce bright yellow daisy flowers that are about 1 inch in diameter. Leaves are bright green. Forget-me-not is a biennial that is treated like an annual. The clusters of tiny flowers are clear blue, pink, or white. The medium green leaves are hairy and sticky. Plants grow best in cool weather in moist, well-drained soils. Sow seeds directly in the garden in early spring. Once established, plants freely reseed and may become invasive.

A cascading growth habit and colorful flowers make these a favorite for hanging baskets and containers. Flowers also attract hummingbirds. Plants perform best when given midday shade. Feed monthly with a balanced liquid fertilizer. Allow the soil to dry to the touch between waterings.

Elegant seed heads (6 to 12 inches long) grace the tops of the plants. Plant 18 to 30 inches apart in well-drained, moist, fertile soils. Seeds may be started indoors or sown directly outside 6 to 8 weeks before last frost. Also shown on page 2.

Height 1 to 2 feet Width 12 inches Full sun to part shade

Hummingbirds and butterflies are attracted to the 4-inch round clusters of red, pink, white, or violet starshaped flowers of this East African native. Leaves are elliptical and dark green. During warm summer weather this container or bedding plant lights up the landscape. Plants prefer sunny sites in average, well-drained soil that is kept moderately moist. They do well in containers.

Height 1 to 3 feet Width 2 feet Full sun to part shade

Commonly grown as a culinary and medicinal herb, perilla resembles basil and has green or purple leaves. Plants offer an excellent contrast to other landscape and container plantings. Flowers are small and inconspicuous. Deadheading helps prevent abundant self-sowing.

Grandiflora types have large flowers (up to 5 inches across), but fewer flowers per plant and poor tolerance to rainy weather.

Milliflora types are compact plants with large numbers of 1-inch diameter flowers and good weather tolerance.

Multiflora types are compact plants that are more floriferous than grandifloras and have better tolerance to wet weather.

Spreading or groundcover types possess excellent heat and drought tolerance, require little maintenance, and spread several feet.

Single or double forms are available in many types. Deadhead grandiflora types for repeat blooms. Prune plants back severely in midsummer if plants get open and leggy.

The flowers of some cultivars open in the morning and close at midafternoon or in cloudy, rainy weather. Good drainage is essential for best performance.

Plants prefer a fertile, well-drained soil, but tolerate poor, dry sites. Although often treated as annuals, plants are actually short-lived perennials. Start seed indoors 6 to 8 weeks before frost. Deadheading promotes new flowers.

Sow seeds indoor 6 to 8 weeks before the average last frost in spring. They also can be sown directly outside after the danger of frost has passed.

Height 4 to 9 inches Width 18 inches Full sun

The flowers resemble a fan as all of the petals emerge from one side. The flowers are borne at the stem tips and leaf axils. The thickened leaves are serrated and dark green. Plants prefer well-drained soils and are tolerant of high heat and humidity. Fan flower is commonly grown in containers and hanging baskets to allow the blooming stems to cascade. Plants are normally propagated from cuttings.

Height 10 to 36 inches Width 10 to 18 inches Full sun

African marigold has the largest flowers (up to 5 inches in diameter) of the marigolds commonly grown in Iowa gardens. Flowers are typically yellow, orange, or creamy-white and strongly scented. Double flowers appear in midsummer and continue until frost. Leaves are dark green and deeply divided. Plants prefer well-drained to dry soils. Regular deadheading encourages new blooms. Large plants may require staking. Start seeds indoors 4 to 6 weeks before the last frost or scatter seeds directly in the garden after the danger of frost has passed.

The 2- to 3-inch-diameter, daisy-like flowers may be yellow, orange, or reddish orange and are a magnet for butterflies. Plants bloom profusely from mid- to late summer. Leaves are bright green, large, and somewhat rounded. Plants prefer full sun and well-drained soils. They perform best in hot, dry locations. Sow seed indoors 6 to 8 weeks before the last frost or directly in the garden after the danger of frost has passed.

Sow seeds indoors 10 to 12 weeks before the last frost. Also shown on back cover.

Clusters of tiny, tubular, five-petaled flowers cover this sprawling annual all summer. Flower colors include white, pink, lavender, purple, yellow, peach, red, and bicolors. Flowering declines in hot weather. Plants are used frequently as edging and in hanging baskets or other containers. Plants prefer moist, well-drained, fertile soils. Sow seeds indoors 10 to 12 weeks before the last frost.

The light blue or white five-petaled flowers are most abundant in spring and sporadic thereafter. Moist, well-drained soils are best. Plants are propagated primarily from cuttings.

Height 5 to 9 inches Width 6 to 8 inches Shade to full sun

A favorite in the spring garden, pansy is noted for its "facelike" flowers. The edible flowers are available in a wide range of colors including blue, lavender, purple, burgundy, red, orange, pink, peach, yellow, white, rust, and black. Many cultivars have contrasting colors or markings on the center of three of the five petals. Deadhead to prolong blooming. Plants often decline and die with arrival of hot weather. Plants prefer moist, well-drained, fertile soils. Start seeds indoors 8 to 10 weeks before the last frost. Seedlings can be transplanted outside one month before the final frost; they grow and bloom best in cool weather.

Sow seeds directly in the garden in early spring. Several AAS winners.

For peak performance, plants must be deadheaded regularly, planted in a sunny location with good air circulation, and receive consistent moisture. Shady sites or sites with poor air circulation often lead to powdery mildew and fewer blooms. Sow seeds directly in the garden after danger of frost.
